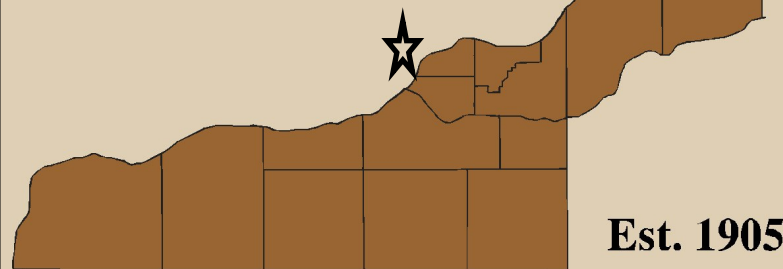

## Financial Report

The figures given below are from the financial reports shared with the board of directors at their monthly meetings.

The checkbook balance is \$122,099.72 with additional CD's at 4%.

Large expenses in April included insurance (\$13,168), a new printer, copier, scanner (\$5,031) and maintenance of the A/P house heating and cooling system (\$1,202). The large bill in May was fire and liability insurance on the property (\$13,168). In June, PerMar was paid \$1,545 for six months security.

RICHs is still the fiscal agent for the Civil War Monument fund of approximately \$3,300 invested in a certificate of deposit at Vibrant Credit Union.

Friends has a small amount (less than \$1,000) at Black Hawk Bank and Trust.

The distribution for Birdies for Charity will be October 9th. Thank you to the 44 donors for sharing \$4,300 plus "the bump." Those funds were designated for the restroom renovation, but the scope of that project was downsized to replacing toilets and faucets, and removing wallpaper and painting. Needless to say, other projects remain. There is a large bill with Northwest Mechanical that will require using money from the cd;s or investments. Otherwise, the finances are in a positive position. Thank you to our membership and friends for their support.

## Don't Cook Tonight ...

Ask just about anyone who grew up in Rock Island County in the 1950's and 1960's if they remember Chicken Delight and the most common response will be a smile accompanied by them singing "Don't Cook Tonight Call Chicken Delight." It was a special night for sure when the delivery person handed over fried chicken, French fries, corn sticks, and a packet of cranberry sauce dinners on paper plates with another paper plate stapled on top to keep the food warm and in place. There may not be as many people, though, who remember that Chicken Delight was a product of Rock Island.

Al Tunick was born in Montreal, Quebec on February 28, 1915, and later moved to New York with his family where they became naturalized citizens. In 1934 they moved to Chicago then to Rock Island in 1936 where he remained. Over the course of his professional life, he was president of the Franchise Group, owner of Karmelkorn Shoppes, Inc. and a Soup "R Sandwich franchise. Mr. Tunick began working for AD Harris Scrap Metal in 1947 and later organized his own firm, Rock Island Industrial Movers.

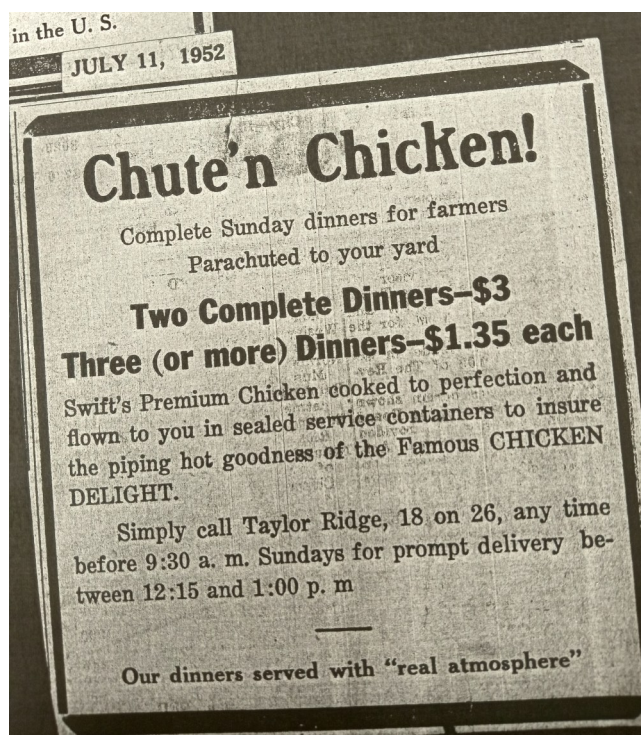
In 1950 he bought Deacon Products Co which sold deep friers. He and some of his friends began experimenting with different types of deep-fried food when they landed on deep frying chicken that had been seasoned with spicy breading. Until that point, chicken was normally pan-fried and took quite a while to cook. This method was unique and much faster. By 1952 he was marketing this product through small

take-out and delivery locations under the name Chicken Delight.

The Korean War was close to ending and women were working outside the home leaving them with less time to cook dinner. The catchy jingle, played frequently on the radio, took hold and dinners became much easier. Chicken Delight grew to over 1,000 locations in the United States, and a group of Canadian businessmen bought the rights for Canada, opening the first location in Portage la Prairie, Manitoba.

While Chicken Delight was growing in popularity in Moline and Rock Island, a story appeared in the July 15, 1952, edition of the Rock Island Argus. Edgar C. Cook, Jr. reported on the opening of Rock Island County's "newest private farm airport, appropriately christened International Cow Pasture No. 2." International Cow Pasture

No. 1, located in Virginia, was owned and operated by Arthur Godfrey of radio and television fame. After five years of construction Duane and Warren Mueller, along with help from Richard McQuadry and several of their friends, completed construction of a hangar which housed their only aircraft. The airstrip was described as

bumpy and rolling, but safe for travel.

While helping on his father's farm one summer day, Warren Mueller got "extremely hungry." Realizing it was a long hike back to the house for a quick snack, he'd given up on the idea of taking a break when a plane flew overhead making him wish it was possible to drop food



from airplanes. He then thought of the catering service operating in Rock Island that delivered chicken dinners and an idea struck him. He had a plane and a runway, why couldn't they deliver chicken dinners to farm families by air. Chutes n' Chicken took flight. Their wives made parachutes out of tablecloth material, Chicken Delight prepared and delivered the chicken to the Moline Airport, the Mueller's flew to Moline, packaged the dinners and attached them to the parachutes. Friends and family benefitted from the experimental deliveries and soon after they were in a not very profitable but fun business.

The Mueller's studied detailed plat maps showing where their deliveries each Sunday were going, and before take-off they placed the boxed dinners in plastic bags, tied them to the parachute lines then dropped the dinners at the delivery location. And the rules were simple, "1. Eat the chicken. (But, of course). 2. Put para

chute in plastic bag. 3. Secure bag with Mueller's name tag (which was included in the dinner). 4. Drop bag in mailbox. 5. Enclose remittance in provided envelope. 6. Drop envelope in mailbox." They also included a note with each dinner asking the recipient to let their friends know if they enjoyed the dinner, and if not, please let them know what they could do to improve.

There were no suggestions. No dinners missed their targets, although one of the Mueller's said he saw a farmer climbing a maple tree to retrieve his delivery. Remarkably, all but one parachute was returned. It ended up in the home of a Detroit, Michigan woman who was visiting friends near Edginton and wanted to keep it as proof to her Michigan friends that her chicken dinner did, in fact, fall from the sky. It is possible, however, that she did mail it back. In a letter to the Mueller's complimenting the experience, she offered to do so. The Mueller's plan was only to have some fun and provide a delivery service to local farmers, but they did make a \$.26 profit one year, calling it a success.

All good things must come to an end, though.



As other fast-food franchises like McDonald's and KFC expanded their operations, Chicken Delight sales declined, and the company was sold to Consolidated Foods (now Sara Lee) in 1965. The memories and the jingle are pleasant memories, though.

## Job Description: Director of Operations

### Job Summary

The Rock Island County Historical Society (RICHS) is seeking a dedicated and experienced Director of Operations to oversee the organization's daily management, financial operations, event coordination, and collection management. The Director of Operations will work closely with the Board of Directors, volunteers, and the community to ensure the Society's mission is upheld while fostering growth and sustainability. This role will take on key operational responsibilities currently managed by the President, allowing the President to focus on strategic planning and broader organizational initiatives.

### Key Responsibilities

#### 1. Organizational Leadership & Management

- Be on-site Wednesday through Saturday to manage daily operations.

- Supervise and provide direction to staff and volunteers.

- Implement and update the organization's strategic plan.

- Act as a liaison between the Board, staff, and volunteers, ensuring alignment with organizational goals.

- Oversee day-to-day operations, allowing the President to focus on strategic initiatives.

#### 2. Financial Oversight & Revenue Generation

- Assist in budget development, financial planning, and reporting to the Board.

- Oversee payroll, expense management, and financial records.

- Identify and develop new revenue sources to enhance financial sustainability.

- Lead and participate in fundraising initiatives.

#### 3. Event & Program Coordination

- Oversee and coordinate key events hosted by RICHS.

- Develop and implement programs to increase membership, revenue, and community engagement.

#### 4. Collection & Museum Management

- Supervise collection management and artifact preservation.

- Ensure compliance with museum best practices and utilize the PastPerfect database.

- Oversee museum tours, school group visits, and special events.

#### 5. Communications & Community Engagement

- Maintain regular communication with Board members, staff, volunteers, and donors.

- Contribute to newsletters and provide regular updates on activities and accomplishments.

- Assist in organizing and participating in key meetings, including Board meetings.

### Qualifications & Skills

- Bachelor's degree in museum studies, history, nonprofit management, business administration, or a related field (preferred).

- Experience in nonprofit administration, museum operations, or a related field.

- Strong leadership and management skills, with experience overseeing staff or volunteers.

- Financial acumen, including budgeting, revenue generation, and expense management.

- Experience in event planning, fundraising, and grant writing.

- Excellent communication and interpersonal skills.

- Proficiency in museum database management (e.g., PastPerfect) is a plus.

## Scam—Just When You Thought It Was Safe

Have you noticed a blossoming of tip jars and donation jars, or “go fund me” pages? Everyone is watching expenses a little more closely. One little piece came to light at RICHS in June.

A detective from the Arsenal called to say our donation jar at the Arsenal Museum had been robbed. That was quite a surprise since no one was aware of such a thing. It seems that the box labeled donations for Rock Island County Historical Society was placed in the museum at some point in time, and someone had been regularly collecting whatever money was in it until someone else did a “grab and run” after breaking the lock on the box. Of course, RICHS would not have placed such a box anywhere let alone a federal installation.. Consequently, one robber was robbed by another.

Moral of the story: Check your information before you donate.

## Technology

**Artificial Intelligence** is in the news everyday. It has positive and negative potential, all of which come with challenges. RICHS has had an excellent experience using AI with the process for scanning the card files for the book collection.

Several years ago the Moline Regional Community Foundation awarded RICHS a grant for a card scanner and the software to scan the cards related to the book collection to make the list available on-line and more easily searched in house.

After three years of processing in a traditional manner, we were only in the “K’s”. After some trial runs, our Director of Operations found an inexpensive and quick solution using AI and the remaining cards were processed in less than a month.

The catalogue of books will be available online when the new webpage goes active.

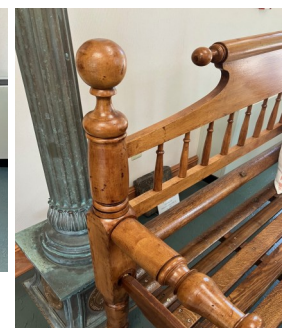

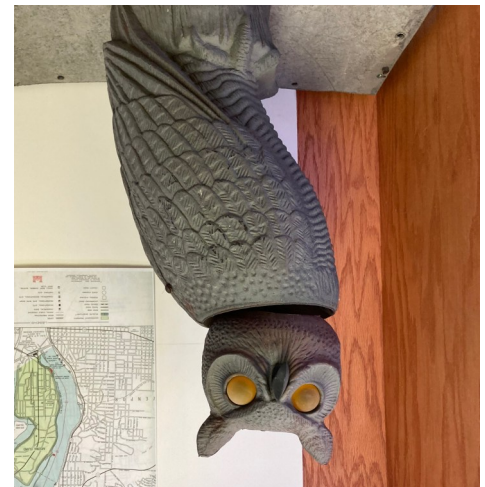
